Lilburn

Lilburn was incorporated in its early years, but never organized. Later, Lilburn was incorporated by an act of the General Assembly in 1955.

Lilburn is in the western part of the county.

The Seaboard Air Line Railroad runs through the south part of the town and the Lawrenceville-Atlanta much traveled paved highway skirts the opposite border of the village.

Lilburn was incorporated years ago but the municipal government was never organized and made to function, it is claimed. The inhabitants were so quiet, well behaved, orderly and law abiding that there was no need for mayors, policemen and other municipal officers. The town has got along well without them.

Among those who lived there in the early history of the town were the following families: Carroll, Nash, Jordan, Brownlee, Harmon, Kennerly, McDaniel, Young, Dickens, Pickens, Mathews, Kelley, Garner.

Churches

Camp Creek Church is out about two miles south of the village. It is one of the oldest churches in the county. Liberty Church is in the village near the highway. The meetinghouse is a splendid brick structure. The auditorium is large and there are a number of rooms used for Sunday school purposes.

Public School Plans

Lilburn has one of the best public school plans in the county. Many new attractive dwellings have been constructed in Lilburn and along the highway. The people are friendly and everybody is everybody's neighbor. It is apparent, too, that they are a thrifty and contented people.
