## A New Search Engine

Recently, I received an e-mail from a genealogy list I subscribe to, suggesting a search engine which provides its search results in clustered results. I was intrigued and went to check it out.

There are many search engines on the Internet and they are all good. My favorite search engine has been Google®. Any search engine depends on its search technique and its presentation philosophy. I have always found Google to be the most interesting from a computer and genealogy viewpoint. A previous article discusses Google Groups which is a facility I use frequently when I have a question on “how to I do that?” or “where can I find that?” Back in November 2003, Ginny Jenkins gave a program, “How to Drink from the Fire hose Without Drowning in Data” which helped us prune the results obtained by a search by focusing with relevant keywords, using Boolean logic. I didn’t expect this new one to offer anything new.

I was wrong.

Visisimo<<http://www.vivisimo.com>> is a competitor of Google and its presentation of results lead me to a direct link to a branch of my family.

A press release from their site states:

Vivísimo Launches Clusty: Pittsburgh, PA, 30 September 2004 — Vivísimo (www.vivisimo.com), the leading provider of intelligent clustering and meta-search software for organizing search results, today unveiled Clusty.com, the first full-service search site powered completely by breakthrough clustering technology. Instead of simply presenting long lists of results, Clusty.com groups search results into folder topics, giving users a quick overview of the main themes in the results and letting them focus on topics of interest. Designed to relieve consumers of information overload and provide easy access to information that is usually overlooked with current search engines, Clusty changes forever how consumers do general Web searches as well as shopping, blogs, gossip, images,

Wikipedia and people searches.

— [...] Vivísimo organizes search results on the fly into folders containing related information. Users can click on folders that seem most relevant and drill down into them, dismissing those that are too far off. In a sense, the searcher is creating an individualized hierarchy while being prompted “Key trends and themes emerge from the content, and they’re hierarchical,” Taylor said. “With our technology you can tease out ideas. It uncovers surprising relationships users may not have known existed.”

On the left hand side of the results screen is a list giving the cluster results. The first line contains the search criteria and the results count. The following lines are the “cluster” list each with its own results count. Among the clusters presented for one of my surnames were family, association, images/poems, lay evangelists, calendar, registered and school. You can bet I headed for the family cluster first. It was in this cluster I found the site of most interest to me. I am sure I could have found it using another search engine, also. However, using Visisimo, it was one of only 13 suggested sites.

The default search arena is “the Web”. However, by using the drop down list, you can select from various sources, limiting your search further. I have not explored this much but I did notice “eBay” as a selection. You shoppers out there may find this focus interesting. The site and its use are explained on the Help page.

Try it and let me know the results of your searches.

## Oct Meeting Notes

### Learn Any Software in 30 Minutes

Everett Butler’s presentation put forward an interesting concept. He proposed that people should let software teach them what its capacity is. This is quite a departure from going to the manual to learn. Everett quickly admitted that most software cannot be learned in 30 minutes. However, it should not take months or years to be comfortable with a software package.

He created a word processing document and a spreadsheet document which have been uploaded to the CAGG-NI website and will assist you in practicing his concept of Guided Discovery Learning. Each document provides information in a manner which leads you to learn a concept about the software. Once the concept is grasped, you can then practice it on your own to commit the newly gained knowledge to long term memory. When you are finished and asked if you want to save the document, answer “no”. In this way, you can continue to use the same file over and over again.

The word processing document starts by displaying the various types of tabs available: left, right, center, decimal align, etc. Other concepts are also presented such as justification, text selection, searching, column and table functions.

The spreadsheet contains different tabs for each of the following: formatting, editing, formulas, formula – adjustment, formula – relative and absolute and a final tab for data duplication and sorting.

Go to the CAGG-NI website and download these files and try them. Even if you use different software (these are created for Microsoft’s Word and Excel), you should be able to open them in your software and practice. One caution, however, I don’t know how Works Excel will handle the multiple spreadsheets in one workbook as each Works version of Excel contains only one spreadsheet.

# Christmas List for 2004!

Some of you will remember when you first purchased a CD-ROM burner and paid \$400 in 1998 (currently \$20). The reason and justification was that one CD-ROM disc replaced over 450 floppy diskettes, which often failed. Now we have DVD burners that will store the data of 6 CDs and with the newest technology the Double Layer burners that will store 12 times the old CD-ROM disc burners. One piece of plastic (disc) will now store over 8100 floppies!

Next year, the Blu-Ray burners will be available to consumers and you can multiply those numbers by a factor of three or 25GB and 50GB for dual layers. However, they are currently around \$3000. Just a point of reference, DVD burners were \$17,000 in 1997, while the single layer (4.7GB) DVD burners are now around \$100. With the dual layer burners (DL) (8.5GB) around the \$150 internal drive and \$250 external drive, it is a good value for the 4 to 5X DL burner.

I would recommend either the Toshiba or the Plextor Dual Layer burners if you are in the market this year and I would like to meet the genealogist who has more than 8.5GB of data (and hope they have my ancestors in their tree).

On to another new technology. JVC equips digital camcorder with hard disks. The two Everio models will pack a 1 inch 4-Gbyte Microdrive, along with a 2-Mpixel CCD and a 10x zoom. The 1-inch hard disk drive will store one hour of DVD quality video. JVC believes that the cameras using the 8 cm disks are considered bulky and the solid-state memory cameras have poor picture quality. This statement is also backed up by the November 2004 Consumer Reports.

To steady the hard-disk drive that is prone to being bumped, JVC developed a system which has gel dampers set on all faces of the camera's hard-disk slot so that the drive is "floating" when it is in operation.

The two Everio models are MC100, measures 41 x 103 x 71mm, weighs 315 grams with batteries and MC200 is 74 x

56 x 94 mm in size and weighs 355 grams and records in MPEG-2 (DVD) format. One very interesting fact is that JVC investigated the possibility of MPEG-4 and H.264 but found it difficult to achieve a picture quality equal to that of DVD / MPEG-2 format.

The camera also functions as a 2-Mpixel still camera with a 10x optical zoom. If it was a 6-Mpixel CCD, it could replace your 35 mm camera. However, most video cameras have less than a 1-Mpixel CCD so at 2-Mpixel, there should be some high quality video produced.

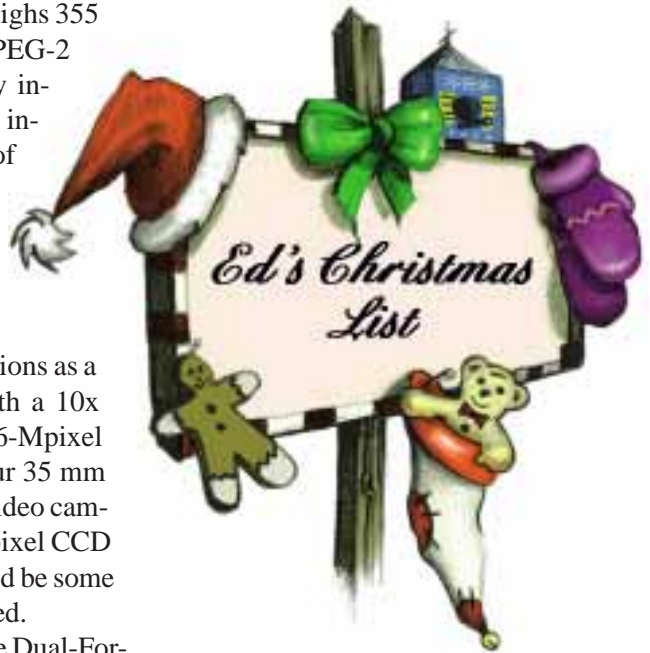

About the Author

One thing I see immediately that I wish the author identified would be to highlight what are the new and improved functions in Version 11 compared to Version 10. Even better would have been to see a "history" of what the changes have been overall from version to version. Seeing such a list would have made me want to be sure I understand and use the newer functions in this version 11. Alas, this is not identified.

The book itself covers 416 pages. Each chapter is mainly comprised of screen shot images referring to the particular functionality being reviewed. It can be very difficult to make out clearly all of the details on the screen shot images. Most of the pages contain at least 2 screen images showing various functions. This book could be hard on the eyes for the images but OK for the descriptions themselves.

Family Tree Maker contains functionality to create scrapbooks and family history books. Not all software packages can perform these functions. This is where Family Tree Maker appears to excel in performance.

The book appears to cover an incredible number of topics. Most of us rarely use software to its fullest capability. Browsing through some of the topics may give us a better idea of using a function for something that we did not even know existed. If you can learn to take advantage of a software capability to make your data collecting and reporting more beneficial for you then do so. Using some of the features can help you better prepare future research efforts because you were able to organize and identify these tasks for future research.

I think you will find this book to be a useful tool in using Family Tree Maker Version 11 to its fullest capabilities.
