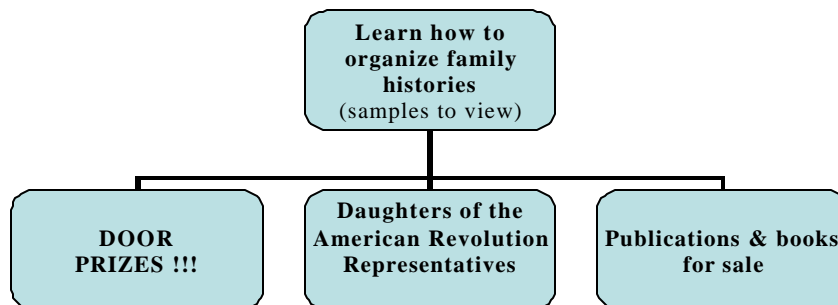

Duduit Cemetery Preservation Master Plan

Location

The Duduit (or Duduit – LaCroix) Cemetery is located in the southeast corner of Scioto County on a terrace overlooking the Ohio River. The cemetery is in a grove of trees about ¼ mile west of the intersection of Gallia Road and Raike Road, south of Franklin Furnace, in Green Township.

The Master Plan Vision

The cemetery should be maintained in a grove of trees on the rise. Under the shade of the trees a shade tolerant, thin, brushy ground cover should be encouraged. The ground cover should be cut or mowed periodically to allow visibility of the markers. The existing foundation ruins should be covered with clean fill and the ground cover should be encouraged across the north side of the rise.

Access to the cemetery should be along a graveled path extending from nearby vehicular parking. Vehicular access will be allowed during normal business hours through security gates and on weekends provided 48 hours of notification. The path should wind up to the top of the rise with a gentle curve. There won't be a fence tightly delineating the area of the rise with the markers. A low fence will circumscribe the cemetery rise at a distance of approximately 75 feet from the area with the markers. The graveled path will lead through a gate in the fence. The fence will be a low, chained-link style fence with height between 3 feet and 4 feet. The historic marker will be moved to the outside of the gate. There will be buffers of mowed grass inside and outside of the fence. Brush and shrubs will be permitted to grow along either the inside or outside (or both sides) of the fence.

The fundamental, underlying principle for the preservation of the Duduit Cemetery rests on community wide cooperation. In adopting this plan, New Steel, the Scioto County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society, the Scioto County Historical Society, and other community organizations agree to work in a spirit of cooperation in preserving the cemetery, carrying out routine maintenance, working with Township Trustees and other elected officials, and seeking funds that may be necessary from time to time to maintain or improve conditions at the cemetery. These groups also agree that this spirit of cooperation will be passed on to successors.

Access to the cemetery is a guiding principle of this master plan. New Steel and its successors agree to work in a spirit of cooperation with the local community to assure safe and reasonable access to the Duduit Cemetery.

Cemetery Advisory Committee

New Steel, Inc., in consultation with the Scioto Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society, will create a Cemetery Advisory Committee. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will have authority over all business and matters concerning the Duduit Cemetery. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve by majority vote all business affairs and all matters involving the cemetery. The Cemetery Advisory Committee has authority to approve of activities such as rubbings, approve of plans to repair markers, approve of plans to retire and replace a marker, and would provide advice and recommendations on matters such as fence repair or replacement, path maintenance, and vegetation and landscaping issues. The composition of the committee includes a representative of the property owner, a representative of the Scioto County Historical Society, and a representative of the Scioto Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society. In resolving disagreements, any member of the Cemetery Advisory Committee may appeal in writing to the Director, Ohio Historical Society, and the Director will provide an advisory opinion in a timely manner.

The Cemetery Advisory Committee may post hours for cemetery visitation. The Committee will review and approve all access policies proposed by New Steel or its assigns or successors. The Committee will review all complaints or concerns regarding access, and may seek guidance from the Township Trustees, other elected officials, or the Ohio Historical Society, in resolving concerns regarding cemetery access.

The Cemetery Advisory Committee will coordinate routinely with the Township Trustees to provide contact information and to report any outstanding issues.

The charter of the Cemetery Advisory Committee will establish the terms of service and provide for replacement of members at the end of a term of service and replacement due to vacancy.

All other matters would be addressed through proper channels established under Ohio Revised Code and Ohio Administrative Code, including disputes, exhumation, and complaints such as desecration. Matters not covered in this agreement would be first submitted to Township Trustees to establish the proper procedures to be followed.

Cemetery Improvements

Phase 1: Taking Stock.

The first step in implementing the master plan is to record current conditions at the cemetery. The Cemetery should be carefully mapped to show elevations, markers, trees larger than 6 inch diameter, the foundation ruins, and any other noteworthy element. The larger trees should be identified to at least the Genus level. The markers should be photographed. An effort should be made to identify the foundation ruins.

After a report of the current conditions has been prepared and presented to the Cemetery Advisory Committee, the trash should be collected and hauled away. Some of the larger debris may require more effort. The foundation ruins should be carefully photographed and this area covered with clean fill dirt.

Phase 2: Vegetation Plan.

The next step is to create a vegetation plan for the cemetery. The vegetation plan will specify by common name (and, if practical, by genus and species) the following: (1) a list of existing plants that are to be encouraged, (2) a list of plants that are to be allowed, and (3) a list of plants that will not be allowed. As much as practical, most of the existing larger trees should be encouraged and protected during construction. A landscape architect should be consulted to obtain recommendations for ground cover plants and for lists of plants that will be allowed and won't be allowed. Plants native to this area should be encouraged, especially if mentioned in historical sources as commonly found in cemeteries along this part of the Ohio River valley. Plants that are difficult to maintain, such as wild grape, cinquefoil, and poison ivy, should not be allowed.

It is likely that New Steel will have to clear the existing vegetation, till the ground surface, and plant the desired vegetation. The kinds of vegetation against the fence and in the zones just inside and just outside the fence also need to be selected and approved by the Cemetery Advisory Committee. New Steel will have responsibility to purchase and plant the selected vegetation after the fence has been installed.

Phase 3: The Fence.

During initial construction phases New Steel will place and maintain a brightly colored temporary fence (such as orange snow fence) around the cemetery with a buffer of at least 50 feet from the markers. After the initial phases of construction, New Steel will erect a permanent fence that will be bordered by a low hedge of shrubs or brush. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will consider several different styles of fencing. In selecting the style of fencing the Cemetery Advisory Committee may consult with others as deemed appropriate by the Committee. The Cemetery Advisory Committee may also consider factors such as cost and maintenance in selecting the style of fencing. The Committee will present in writing its decision to New Steel. The fence shall be placed to surround the cemetery and rise at a distance of at least 75 feet from the markers. One example of a style of fence would be a low (3 feet high) chain-link fence with gate. New Steel's responsibility to erect a permanent fence in a timely manner following the initial phases of construction shall remain regardless of any delay or failure of the Cemetery Advisory Committee to select a style of fencing.

Phase 4: Gravel Path.

The path leading from the parking lot to the cemetery will extend through the gate in the fence. A gravel path that is bordered by either brick pavers or treated posts is one option. The Cemetery Advisory Committee may consider other options. A curving or sinuous design will help set off the cemetery from the rigid structure of the surrounding facility. A gravel path can be maintained at a relatively low cost for time and materials, however, the Committee and New Steel may wish to consider that this kind of path poses difficulties for those with disabilities to safely and easily use.

Cemetery Restoration

During construction, the cemetery area should be labeled on construction drawings with contractor notes, and the contractor will be required to place and maintain a brightly colored temporary fencing such as orange snow fencing. No construction vehicles will be allowed within the protected area during construction. The protective fencing will be placed so that it generally circumscribes the rise and is at least 50 feet from the grave markers.

After construction, it is the responsibility of New Steel, Inc., working in consultation with the Cemetery Advisory Committee, to complete the restoration of the cemetery and establish procedures to ensure routine maintenance is carried out. New Steel, Inc., will provide the materials and labor necessary to remove trash, place fill in the foundation, remove any trees, encourage ground cover in the shaded area, erect the fence and gate, relocate the marker, and construct the graveled path. New Steel, Inc., will provide in writing to the Cemetery Advisory Committee progress reports. The restoration of the cemetery will be completed within 180 days following the initiation of operations at the plant. If there are concerns for heavy construction continuing after the initiation of operations at the plant, New Steel, Inc., may secure in writing an extension of the deadline.

Cemetery Maintenance

General up-keep. New Steel or its assigns or successors will have responsibility for routine, regular, trash collection, mowing and/or trimming, and other routine ground keeping maintenance. That is, the routine maintenance of the grounds, fencing, and path at the cemetery will be a routine responsibility of the operation of the plant.

Fence maintenance and improvements. New Steel, or its assigns or successors, have responsibility for routine maintenance of the fence, gate, path, and vegetation along both sides of the fence. Upgrades, improvements, or substantial repairs to the fence shall be administered and financed by the Township Trustees according to provisions of Ohio Revised Code and Ohio Administrative Code for maintenance of private, inactive, cemeteries. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve all plans for substantial repairs or changes to the fence, including the gate, and including the path.

Removal of large trees. Costs of removing large trees and other substantial expenses required for improvements within the cemetery will be administered and financed by the Township Trustees according to provisions of Ohio Revised Code and Ohio Administrative Code for maintenance of private, inactive, cemeteries. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve all plans for substantial improvements, including removing live trees and new plantings. For emergency tree removal or other emergency actions, New Steel or its assigns or successors may take such actions as deemed appropriate and necessary. New Steel will report such actions to the Cemetery Advisory Committee and the Township Trustees.

Grave marker maintenance

The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve all proposals regarding the maintenance or care of grave markers. The Committee may seek guidance from the Scioto Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society or others before providing comments. If damage or other conditions warranting maintenance are observed by New Steel staff or are reported to New Steel, the Cemetery Advisory Committee, or the Township Trustees, the Committee will ensure that the damage or conditions are recorded and will provide recommendations for any necessary maintenance.

Duduit Cemetery Preservation Master Plan

The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve all proposals to re-set a grave marker, header, or footer that has fallen over or tilted. The Committee will review and approve all proposals to repair a broken marker, header, or footer. The Committee will review and approve all proposals to retire a marker and to replace or install a new marker, header, or footer.

Care of grave markers and other cemetery artifacts and other signs. The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve maintenance procedures for mowing, cutting, or maintaining the vegetation in and around the cemetery. The procedures should include safe distance that any (gas powered) string trimmer or other power equipment must be kept from markers and other cemetery artifacts.

The Cemetery Advisory Committee will review and approve any study of the markers. In addition, without prior written approval of the Ohio Genealogical Society, no application of paint or other similar substance to any marker or cemetery artifact is allowed, and, without prior written approval of the Ohio Genealogical Society no rubbing of any marker or cemetery artifact will be allowed.

Evidence of vandalism, including evidence of suspected vandalism, will be reported to New Steel who will ensure that the Cemetery Advisory Committee and appropriate local authorities are promptly notified.

Herewith we present to the readers of *The Blade* two portraits of well-known business men, together with an interior view of their place of business. **J.F. Menke** and **Geo. J. Schmidt**, partners in the firm of Menke & Schmidt, are proprietors of "The Central", one of the finest retail grocery stores in this or any other city. The partnership was formed Jan. 1st, 1895, when they took possession of their present quarters. Each had been in business before—Mr. Menke some nine years and Mr. Schmidt six years at the time when they united their interests. They occupy a well-lighted, com-

modious room on Gallia street, in the Kricker building, and run three wagons, employing five people to care for their trade. While they have a large country trade, they cater to the city trade, of which they have a large share. Here one may find anything in the line of fancy groceries of the choicest importation or home brand. "Club House", Edom and Roquefort, are leaders in cheese. Imported sardines, fish and table sauce are in stock of the best grades. Probably their lines of fine teas and coffees will out sample anything of the kind in the city. "Central Star" Flour, made expressly for their trade of Spring and Winter wheat, combines all the requisites of a pastry and bread product. If one doesn't know what to eat these Summer days—that transition season between hay and grass—then call at The Central and let them tell you. Anything in the line shelf goods, choice vegetables, fresh and dried fruits may be secured. Then, too, they keep the Wheelersburg Creamery butter, acknowledged by all judges to be the purest butter made—outranking the Elgin and other fancy brands.
