### Query

In a letter dated July 25, 2009, mailed to SCCOGS:

My mother’s family lived in Pike and Scioto County in the 1800’s and I joined your society in hopes of finding answer to some of the questions I have.

Some years ago, I began the search for my great-grandfather’s birth record and have hit a brick wall many times!

He was William Asbury Samson/Sampson, born 6 February 1829 and died 5 November 1892.

My grandfather, Jacob Nichols Sampson, was born 14 February 1859 to William and his wife Ariette Onsrepta Smith Sampson, one of 7 children born to her.

It is known by my family that Samuel Samson was the father of William though he was not married to William’s mother, Sarah Shepherd Beauchamp.

Sarah was married to John Hubbard Brown when William was a small child and when William and Ariette were married, John H. signed the marriage record as “step-father” since William was not 21 until February 1850 after the marriage in December 1849.

My grandfather was aware of this family information, since he lived in that Ohio area until grown.

On page 829 in THE HISTORY OF THE LOWER SCIOTO VALLEY information about this family was printed, but no mention of William’s parentage. It did list churches in which he worshipped and I wonder if any of those church records remain.

My cousin, John Jacob Sampson, is the last of the male members of our family through a male, his father, Guy Blaine Sampson. He submitted DNA to Family Tree and matches 37 of 37 with a male from the James Samson line. James was the older brother of Samuel. Is that any value in this search?

I wonder if anyone could guide me to records that I have not found.

### SCCOGS OFFICERS JOB DESCRIPTIONS

#### **PRESIDENT**—*Currently held by Terry Minch*

**Bylaws:** "The President shall call meetings of the Chapter and of Officers; preside at meetings; perform duties generally required of this office. The President shall be a member of the Ohio Genealogical Society"

Job Description:

- Presides at regular business meetings
- Calls Executive Committee meetings for decisions and planning
- Appoints Committee Chairs
- Communicates, motivates and leads

#### **VICE PRESIDENT**—*Currently held by Gladys Reynolds*

**Bylaws:** "The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of the President. The Vice-President shall also serve as Program Chairman."

Job Description:

- Plans programs and venues for six meetings and/or chairs committee to do so
- Makes contacts for speakers, verifies schedule, introduces and pays them
- Provides information on programs to Newsletter Editor and Publicity Chair
- Presides at any meeting when the President is absent
- Attends Executive Committee meetings

#### **RECORDING SECRETARY**—*Currently held by Belinda "Bunnie" Bowman-Schaefer*

**Bylaws:** "The Recording Secretary shall keep records of all meetings."

Job Description:

- Attends meetings and records minutes
- Reads minutes of previous meeting at each meeting
- Recruits someone to read and write minutes if she can't be there
- Compiles minutes for year to year as a historical record of activities.

#### **CORRESPONDING SECRETARY**—*Currently held by Janice Edwards*

**Bylaws:** "The Corresponding Secretary shall handle the correspondence pertaining to the chapter."

Job Description:

- Handles mail for P.O. Box 812 to SCCOGS This includes:
  - Picks up mail at P.O. at least twice a week.
  - Records all mail received on Correspondence Log
  - Deliver checks to Treasurer for deposit in a timely manner
  - Pass on publication orders to Publication chair with copy of check or payment
  - Gives research requests to Research Committee
  - Reads appropriate correspondence to members at meetings
- Answers mail that requires a return such as OGS information requests

#### **TREASURER**—*Currently held by Joyce M. Sadler*

**Bylaws:** "The Treasurer shall receive dues and pay bills authorized and approved by the chapter."

Job Description:

- Keeps accurate records of all income and expenditures in a format which can be audited in keeping with the rules of a 501C3
- Makes deposits of checks in a timely manner
- Makes a report at each business meeting & for Executive Comm. if requested
- Pays bills by check as invoices are received
- Compiles and reconciles monthly bank statements
- Figures/reports/pays sales tax to the Ohio Department of Taxation as required
- Files required annual forms to IRS

#### NEWSLETTER EDITOR—Currently held by Joyce M. Sadler

Job Description:

Creates and edits a bimonthly newsletter to members which contains Scioto County genealogical information, news for Chapter members, and information of interest to those with Scioto County ancestors.

Prints and mails the newsletter, Emails newsletter to those with email, maintaining a list of current members who should receive it and following current Post Office rules for bulk mailing. (There could be a committee to do this part.)

#### WEBMASTER—Currently held by Joyce M. Sadler

Job Description:

Maintain the current website as created by Andy Vita and Joyce Sadler and update regularly with current information on meetings and publications as well as adding genealogical links and information.

#### LIBRARIAN—Currently held by Jackie P. Journey

Job Description: Takes responsibility for our holdings at Portsmouth Public Library This includes:

- Keeps materials arranged neatly and repaired if needed
- Processes new additions for shelving
- Keeps supplies in locked cabinet at library and is in charge of key.
- Updates inventory as new materials are added

#### PUBLICATION CHAIR—Currently held by Patricia Lacey

Job Description:

- Keeps Inventory of Publications for Sale
- Fills orders for publications
  - Makes out invoice including tax information
  - Makes sure payment is received
  - Prepares for mailing and mails publications
- Binds printed pags together for unassembled books
- Notifies Webmaster & Newsletter Editor when there are changes in pricing or availability
- Arranges for copies of pubs. as needed; copies of invoices to Treasurer for tax purposes

#### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE—Currently held by Gladys Reynolds & Joyce M. Sadler

Job Description: for Chairman or assigned to committee members

- Keeps records of paid membership in 4x6 card file as well as computer
- Updates Newsletter Editor monthly on new members or address changes
- Attends meetings to collect dues, especially in Dec. & Feb.
- Reaches out for ways to get new members
  - Refreshments at meetings?
  - Name tags at meetings?
  - Door prizes?
  - Incentives for bringing new members?
  - Newsletters to prospective members?
- Encourages membership in OGS

## SCCOGS Officer and Appointed Job Descriptions

### **RESEARCH COMMITTEE** *Currently held by Gladys Reynolds*

#### Job Description for Chairman

Recruits and trains members willing to do Scioto County lookups  
Distributes queries to committee members as they come in  
Researches at appropriate Court House offices & at Portsmouth Pub. Lib.  
Communicates in a professional way with those who send queries and answers in a timely manner.  
Keeps records of surnames/research done/when and by whom

### **PUBLICITY CHAIR-** *Currently held by Gladys Reynolds & Joyce M. Sadler*

#### Job Description:

Writes news releases for Portsmouth Times and Community Common for each meeting and sends to be published 10 days before meetings.

Sends Post Cards of meeting reminders to members without email two weeks before meetings.

Sends email reminders of meetings to members with email a week before meetings.

Writes article each year for Progress Editions of Times and Common.

### **PROJECT COMMITTEE** - *Newly Formed*

This committee would initiate and facilitate any projects which support the purpose of the society "to preserve and collect historical records of Scioto County" in order to publish compiled genealogical material for use in genealogical research. Or this committee could pick a project such as Cemeteries and become a Cemetery Committee.

### **TEMPORARY COMMITTEES**

Nominating Committee should be selected annually in August or October in order to present a slate of officers for the following year to be elected at the December meeting and take office at the first meeting of the calendar year

Bylaws Committee reviews Bylaws every three years to bring them up to present and recommends changes to Executive Committee for presentation to members. If changes are passed they should send copies to OGS and to the IRS.

Financial Committee could explore ways to earn extra funding for projects. They could recommend raising dues, having a fund drive or selling more publications, etc.

Budget Committee should meet once a year or every other year to review and update budget. (Budget review could be a responsibility of the Financial Committee.)

If you would be willing to hold any of the above offices or appointed positions, please advise a current officer or a member of the nominating committee, which will be formed at the October meeting.

From the Portsmouth Times—November 29, 1873—Submitted by Gladys N. Reynolds

### EARLY HISTORY OF WAYNE TOWNSHIP

We have come into possession of an old book covering much of quaint and interesting history of Wayne Township, during the interval of years between April 1809 and April 1821, which we have concluded to make the basis of some articles which we propose to publish in connection with biographical sketches of the oldest citizens of the county. The book has the old fashioned leather back; and seems to have sharpened or dulled many a razor. The paper is blank and rough, the clerk having to rule it as required in keeping the records of the township. From the proceedings of March 6th, 1810, it seems that Uriah Barber, one of the trustees, purchased it for \$2.50, and on the 29th of March, 1810, he received an order—No. 13—from the treasurer for \$6.50, which included four days services as trustee, at \$1 per day and the price of the book. On the inside of the back the first entry reads: "87 1/2 cents Boured of I Bonsor." Across this, lines are drawn, which affords pretty good evidence that the loan was afterwards paid. On the fly leaf we find: "form of Town Order" "Portsmouth date & No—to the Treasurer of Wayne Township pay to John Nopay five mills. By order of the Board of Trustees.

With this form (short, but expressive,) the trustees of Wayne township began to discharge their indebtedness, without any long spun legal technicalities and high sounding phrases.

The earliest officers mentioned are "Charles T. Maston qualify,d to the office of Justice of the Peace October 8th 1808" and "Caleb Hitchcock Qualify,d to the office of Justice of the Peace November the 11th 1808."

### Early History of Wayne Twp Continued from page 7

Maston was from Virginia and was one of the early pioneers, and lived about 7 miles from town on the Chillicothe road. He was a man of sound judgment, a deep thinker, but somewhat haughty, aristocratic, and withal a very profane man when crossed. He died at his residence in this county many years ago. Hitchcock lived on Gallipolis road., about 4 miles from town the farm now owned by John Rhodes. We believe he was from Virginia. He was a farmer by occupation, a Democrat and served one term in the Legislature. Though not very polished he was reputed to be a good officer. He lived and died in the county. He kept a tavern on the place for many years previous and many a dance was given at Hitchcock's inn. The house is still standing.

Jacob Moore, the first constable mentioned, was of a roving disposition, and first lived in Alexandria. At the election in the spring of 1809 he was re-elected constable. He was of Irish descent if not a native of Ireland. If he had a trade we have been unable to find what it was. He was a soldier of the Revolution, and after his death, which occurred about 1820, his relatives tried to secure his pension from the Government, but we believe ineffectually. To constable Moore the following was issued: "To Jacob Moore Constable of Wayne Township Greeting You are hereby Comanded to summon the township officers that were elected for the township aforesaid, to appear before me or some Justice of the Peace to be qualify,d to their Respective offices as the law directs the officers stand Elected as follows to wit trustees Uriah Barber, Wm Huston, and Josiah Shackford. Constables Jacob Moore, James Dawson and Wm McDannold—lister and House appraiser Elijah Glover. House appraisor Isaac Overaker, Overseers of the Poor Aaron Kinney, Wm Lawson, Supervisors John Brown, Wm Price, Caleb Hitchcock and Geo Bowers. Fence Viewers Wm Brady, Martin Funk. Treasurer Jacob C Offnere. Given under my hand the fifth Day of april in the year of our Lord one thousand and eight hundred and nine—Geo W Clingman C.L.K.

A brief review of these gentlemen is wanted to fill up the pages of the early records of the township. On the 10th of April, 1809, Barber, Huston and Shackford "were qualified". Uriah Barber was a farmer who lived on the old Chillicothe road, on the first farm above the Funk farm, now Micklethwait place. He lived in town a portion of his life, but his last days were spent on the farm, where he died over twenty years ago. He was one of the early pioneers and was related to the Kinneys and Briggs.

Wm Huston emigrated to this place from Virginia in January, 1802. He was a colonel of militia, took a great delight in dressing neatly. He died, or was killed, during an absenee from home.


Josiah Shackford came to this county at a very early date, from Connecticut or Vermont. He was a seaman , and an old bachelor. He had considerable money, was eccentric and ingenious, and took great delight in making models for boats. It is said he made two or three voyages across the ocean, only accompanied by his dog Bacchus. Foreign officials discredited his stories, and thinking something was wrong, detained him, but an examination failed to implicate him in any wrong doing. On his last rip over to America he was followed some distance to sea, but the espionage only adduced the fact that Shackford and his dog were at home on the waves. He is represented by those who knew him as being kind hearted, and standing high in the community. He had a fine garden on what is now Front street, we believe between Court and Washington streets, and the boys were in the habit of stealing his fruit. One day he found some lads about to enter, and he said, "boys, I have fixed guns in the grass, with strings on the trigger, so if you come in the guns will go off. But they will not kill you, they will shoot you about the knees." and he pointed to an old musket peeping from out the grass. The boys left, and never came back. They old sailor bok his gun in the house after the boys left, no doubt laughing in his sleeve at the clever but harmless joke he had played on Young America. He died about the year 1821 or 22, and John H. Thornton took charge of the burial and administered on his estate, but whether any relatives of the deceased were ever found, we have been unable to learn. Mr. Shackford was one of the first to be interred in the town cemetery.
