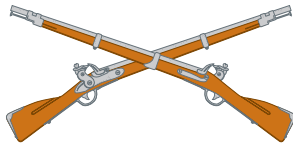

The Battle of Gettysburg — 135 Years Later
As Told by a Soldier in the Army of the
Confederacy



Our guest speaker will be **Michael Johnston** of the Brockville Infantry Company (1862). Last summer 10 members of the Company travelled to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, to participate in the Fourth of July weekend re-enactment of one of the major battles of the American Civil War. In all, some 15,000 fellow re-enactors from around the world participated, the Brockville contingent forming part of the 21st Virginia Regiment. Michael's presentation will include a brief video showing the excitement and drama of the event.

Local History is Popular

Each week he reproduces a photograph depicting Brockville in the past and describes the scene. APOLROD: Saving the Past

When the Ontario Government decided to computerize its land registry records and destroy the original paper copies, the Association for the Preservation of Ontario Land Registry Office Documents (APOLROD) was formed to preserve this valuable part of our past.

More than 500 volunteers all across the province catalogued over 5000 documents so far from all the land registry offices. The items will be microfilmed and transferred to computer format to be made available at local land registry offices. The records cover the period from 1868 to 1955.

The documents themselves will be stored under archival conditions at the Archives of Ontario and in suitable local heritage repositories. APOLROD asks historical and heritage groups throughout the province for ideas on where to store the materials.

THE BROCK MEMORIAL

Daughters of the Empire Order a Handsome Bust of General Brock From Mr. Hamilton McCarthy, a Famous Sculptor

After seven years of unceasing efforts upon the part of all the members, General Brock Chapter, Daughters of the Empire, has at last found itself in the gratifying position of being able to give the order for the erection of a handsome memorial fountain in Brockville of Sir Isaac Brock, after whom the town is named. The order has been given to Mr. Hamilton McCarthy, R.C.A., of Ottawa, the eminent Canadian sculptor, and the memorial will consist of a fountain made of marble and granite surmounted by a bronze bust of General Brock. It is expected that the monument will be placed on Court House Square at the head of Court House avenue, and that the unveiling of the statue will take place next October upon the 100th anniversary of the heroic death of General Brock at Queenston Heights.

The members of General Brock Chapter desire to thank those who have so generously aided them by their contributions and by their kindly words of encouragement. The total cost of the monument has not yet been collected but the ladies of the Chapter felt that in order to have the memorial ready for unveiling on the centenary of General Brock's death, it was necessary to commission Mr. McCarthy to proceed with it at once, and to collect the balance of the cost in the interval. They feel that there will be no difficulty in this as the people of Brockville have shown so much approval of the patriotic movements. ...
