FIRE ROARS THROUGH ALEXANDRIA BLOCK

Two Firms Total Loss 9 Homeless

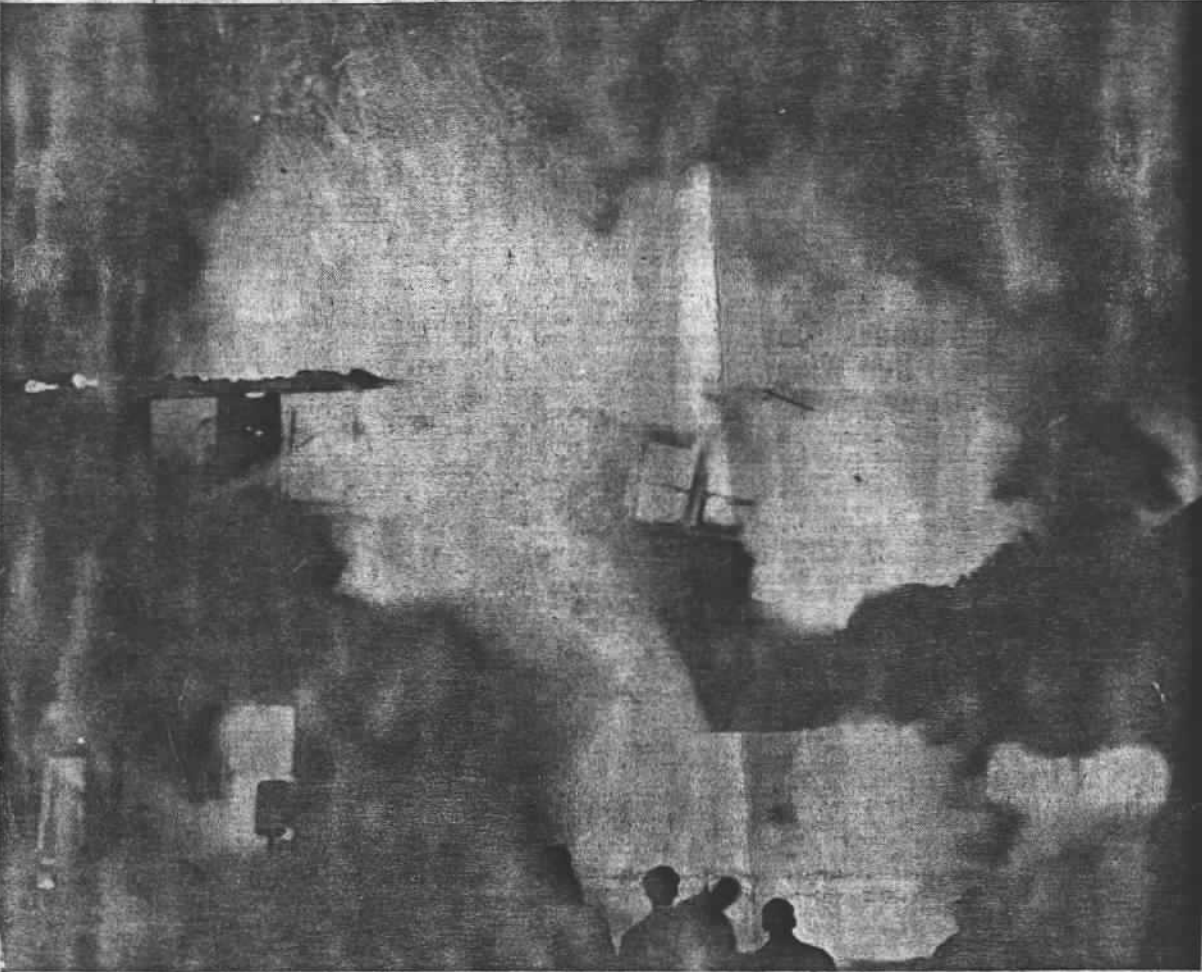

ALEXANDRIA — Five families were left homeless and two businesses and a welfare office destroyed when fire roared through a large, two-store frame and stucco building on Main St. here last night. The loss is expected to exceed \$125,000.

Flames were prevented from spreading to other buildings in the heart of the downtown area by volunteer firemen from this town and Lancaster. Called at 10:45 p.m., the firemen were still spraying water on the burning out shell at 3 a.m.

Destroyed in the blaze were the Country Discount Store, the VanBrock Upholstery Shop, the Glengarry office of the department of social and family services and apartments occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Charles VanBrock; Mr. and Mrs. Alex MacMillan; Mrs. Archie MacMillan, mother of Ivan MacMillan of the Ottawa Rough Riders; Mrs.

Accused In Murder-Robbery Says He's Revolution Fighter

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Stanley Bond, accused of robbery and murder in a Boston bank holdup, says he is a fighter in a revolution against the United States—not a criminal.

Bond, 25, said he had "declared war" on the U.S. as leader of a combat group in an organization he called "Revolutionary Action Force-East."

The young ex-convict college student, who was captured and jailed last week in Grand Junction, Colo., was quoted as making his disclosures in a telephone interview with The Phoenix, a Cambridge-published weekly which caters to university-age readers.

A Boston policeman, Walter Schroeder, 42, was fatally shot during the \$26,000 holdup by three men and two women Sept. 23.

City Editor Vin McLellan of The Phoenix, who conducted the telephone interview with Bond, quoted him as saying:

"I certainly think that anybody who is going to make the decisions that I've made, you know, they have got to get money somewhere. I'm sure."

"I would recommend that everyone go out and rob a bank if they want some . . ."

"One thing I can say, they don't have to kill a cop though . . . to rob a bank."

Bond was a student at Brandeis University near Boston, where he enrolled after serving sentence in the Massachusetts state prison at Walpole for bank robbery.

Brandeis he met Susan Saxe, 21, of Albany, N.Y., and Katherine Power, 21, of Denver, Colo., who are sought in the holdup-killing.

The three worked together in the National Student Strike Information Centre, set up last spring after U.S. troops entered Cambodia and the Kent State shootings.

Faisal Recovering

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — King Faisal of Saudi Arabia underwent a successful urinary channel operation in Vienna Monday, the state-controlled Rivadh radio reported. The 64-year-old Arabian monarch flew to Vienna from a summit conference of Arab heads of state in Cairo which worked out an agreement to end Jordan's civil war.

Bar Long Hairs

SAIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese government decreed Tuesday that long-haired foreign males will not be allowed to enter South Vietnam and "be a bad example for our boys." A spokesman said the order went into effect immediately. All airlines were instructed to advise long-haired passengers bound for Saigon to get their locks shorn or stay away.

Manson Leaps At Judge, Ordered From Courtroom

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Charles Manson has been removed from the courtroom again after taking a flying leap at the judge in the Sharon Tate murder trial.

"In the name of Christian justice, someone should cut your head off!" Manson shouted as he wrestled with bailiffs at the foot of Judge Charles Older's bench Monday.

The bearded, long-haired leader of a hippie-type clan sprang at the judge after telling him: "The minute I see you are

But as the session began, Manson spoke up, asking a chance to question witnesses. The judge refused.

"Are you going to use this courtroom to kill me? Do you want me to be dead?" Manson asked the judge, his voice rising with anger. The judge told him to be silent.

The judge tried to proceed with testimony, but was interrupted by Manson who shouted, "Do you think I'm kidding?"

Earth Horizon Distinct Band Of Red Light

KONSTANZ, West Germany (AP) — Scientist-cosmonaut Vitaly Sevastyanov said Monday that from orbiting Soyuz 9 he observed earth's horizon as a distinct band of red light about 71 miles above the surface.

Another Soviet scientist said the discovery could lead to better spacecraft navigation methods and provide a better idea of the composition of the earth's atmosphere.

The latter knowledge, the scientist said, is necessary for interpretation of data from satellites surveying the earth's resources. And it could tell whether the amount of aerosol, a pollutant in the atmosphere is undergoing a change, which he said could have serious effects on the earth's climate.

Sevastyanov flew a record earth orbit trip of nearly 18 days in June with Col. Axndrian Nikolayex. He told the 21st congress of the International Astronautical Federation here that he carried newly developed optical equipment to observe and photograph the horizon.

"Soyuz 9 allowed us for the first time to obtain spectral observations of our planet over a long period," he said. "One of the principal findings was the observation of an ingenious narrow belt at twilight—when the spacecraft is on the dark side and the observer looks at the sun."

"That's when we saw the belt at an angular distance about 3.9 degrees from the surface. The

Prof. K. Y. Kondratyev, head of the department of physics at Leningrad University, said the information obtained by Soyuz 9 is extremely valuable because "it helps us to use the atmosphere as a prism which gives us information about the composition and structure of the atmosphere."

Kent State Shooting Inexcusable

WASHINGTON (Reuters) — Indiscriminate firing by Ohio National Guards troops into a crowd of anti-war demonstrators at Kent State University May 4 was "unnecessary, unwarranted and inexcusable," president Nixon's commission on campus unrest said.

Four students were killed and nine injured during the shooting "which need never have happened if the National Guard had learned its lessons in crowd control," the commission said.

But the 120-page report of the nine-member commission also blamed the actions of some students for helping create an atmosphere of great turmoil and confusion which prevailed at the time.

The report was the third by the commission, which was headed by former Pennsylvania Governor William W. Scranton and appointed by Nixon after the Kent State shootings and those at Jackson State University in Mississippi May 14.

The first report, released two weeks ago, dealt with the problem of student unrest in the United States and called on Nixon to exercise more moral leadership to help ease the situation.
