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Civil War Veterans of Northeast Tarrant County

Thomas P. Youngblood

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Thomas P. Youngblood served two years in the Confederate Army, as is confirmed by his obituary in Grapevine Sun. He was born in Jefferson County, Alabama, on November 28, 1824, a son of Andrew Youngblood (a native of South Carolina) and his wife, Sarah Flanagan (a native Tennessean). Thomas was first married in Jefferson County, Alabama to Elizabeth Bagley on Dec. 17, 1846. He and his wife appear in the 1850 and 1860 censuses of Jefferson County, Alabama.

He married his second wife, Mrs. N. Hettie Bates, here in Tarrant County in 1872. She was born in 1839 and died in 1907; she is buried beside him in Calloway Cemetery in Euless. Hettie was born in Missouri to a Tennessean father and a Missourian mother.

The 1880 Tarrant County census shows her name as Nancy L. Youngblood. When the 1910 census taker came, she told him she had given birth to seven children, six of whom were still living.

Mr. Youngblood's obituary appeared in the Grapevine Sun on December 8, 1906: "*Obituary of T. P. Youngblood. Bro. T. P. Youngblood was born in Jefferson county, Ala., Nov. 28, 1824, was married to a Miss Allen. There was born to them 4 children, two of whom are still living. He settled in Tarrant, married Mrs. Bates of this county in 1872. There were born to them 4 children, 2 boys and 2 girls. All are living. Brother Youngblood joined the Missionary Baptist church at the age of 27 and has since lived a devoted Christian. He served two years as a Confederate soldier. He was made a Mason when a young man, and when he came to Texas he went in Estelle Lodge, No. 582 as a charter member and has lived a useful Mason since. He was called home June 30, 1906, and we laid him to rest in the cemetery near Tarrant. We, the members of Estelle Lodge extend our greatest sympathy to the bereaved ones. Peace be to the dust of our beloved Brother.*"

Mr. Youngblood's children included Susan E. Youngblood (born about 1851 in Arkansas, according to census records); James Youngblood (born about 1855 in Alabama); William Youngblood (born

about 1858 in Alabama); Mary B. Youngblood (born about 1865 in Texas); and Richard H. Youngblood (born about 1867 in Texas).

In his second marriage, he was the father of Ida B. Youngblood (born in November 1872 in Texas); John M. Youngblood (born in January 1874); Joe H. Youngblood (born in February 1876); and Ella (or Louella) Youngblood (born in May 1878).

Several researchers have submitted information on Thomas P. Youngblood at Ancestry.com. One prospect in the National Park Service's Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System is a soldier in Co. F, 56th Reg. Ala Partisan Rangers (1st Alabama Partisan Rangers). Nothing in this man's file in Washington gives any personal information or residence information to help us determine if he was the Thomas P. Youngblood who settled here in Tarrant County.
