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under Messages: and Source Information: . You can copy/paste this information to your records, but it would have to be separated into the specific fields of the source record. If you download information from FamilySearch.org, a source is created automatically for each individual. If you are using Legacy, when you import a GEDCOM (from anywhere), you can create a source to be added to all the records in the GEDCOM.

**QUESTION:** I am using the Legacy genealogy program. Is there a way to tag all people with a particular surname?

**ANSWER:** Yes. The regular search and tag method is to select Search > Find > Detailed Search. In the first set of condition boxes, enter Individual, Surname, Equals, then enter the surname of your choice. Be sure the "Clear list before this search" option is checked, then click the Create List button. At the bottom of the list, click Options > Advanced Tagging. Select Tag, and the # you want to use. Then click the "Everyone in Search List" button. An easier way (in my opinion) for tagging surnames is to select View > Master Lists > Surname. Highlight the surname of your choice, then click the "Show List" button. Select the tag # you want, then click the "Tag Everyone in List" button. Before using either method, be sure to click the "Untag everyone in File" button for that tag # so you don't accidentally include records from another "tagging" session.

### Favorite Websites



**Genealogy Lookup Forum** A web site of volunteers who will do various types of genealogical look ups such as births, census, cemetery, deaths and marriage. Visit the site to locate a volunteer in your area.

**Reading Railroad Records** 500 service records for Reading Company employees ranging from 1883 to 1964. Includes name, photo, birth date, birth place, educational background, present age and position, complete service records (all positions held and location), and any examinations they have taken. Some of the employees have multiple pages with different photos. You can see how your ancestor aged over the years. Reprints of these records can be ordered for a nominal fee, based on the number of pages in the employee's file.
